That should pretty well take care of our most urgent needs. The saws are beginning to show their age and the increased use has had a serious affect. Larry Lovelle has been more than busy trying to keep them running and expects to have the 14" operational very soon.

OOPS I almost forgot, due to the increased maintenance costs of the saws we are having to raise the saw fees. Effective May 1st the fees will change to an hourly rate: 10"=\$1.00 per hr; 14" =\$1.50 per hr.; 20 " = \$2.00 per hr. This is still a bargain and the first change since the saws were installed 20 some years ago and only the second rate change in the 12 years I've been associated with the shop (hourly shop fee was raised from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per hour).

Jim Bennett called the meeting to order at 6:32. President Rob Leedy was unable to attend because of back problems, and Vice President Daniel Bontempo and Board Chair Geri Esch were both out of town.

Board and Officers in Attendance: Lee Anne Settlemier, Secretary, Kathy Bennett, Treasurer, Members-at-Large: Phil Knutson, Bob Manley, Larry Nassett, Ed Pyritz, Joe Start and Ray Haslebacher.

Show and Tell: Was the letter Q.

Treasurer's Report was presented by Kathy Bennett and approved.

Show Report: Linda Groah thanked members who have been working on the show including Danny Groah, Susan Appleby, Joe Van Cura, Eric Beckland, Phil and Reyne Knutson, Joe Start, Kathy Bennett, and Mary Haslebacher. Tom Robertson, Joe Van Cura, Aaron Currier, and Danny Groah have been working on the fluorescent show. About 500 students have signed up as of this date. We need rock related magazines to sell, such as Rock and Gem. The demonstrator's area is full. The club members were asked to bring a dessert or salad for the Thursday evening dinner before the show. The entree will be provided.

Jon and Lucille Sams 2008 Memorial Scholarship Fund: Ted Johnson reminded us that this meeting was the last opportunity to apply for a scholarship for 2009.

Field Trips: No Field trip is planned for April, but there will be a field trip on May 23 to 25 (Memorial Day weekend) to Glass Buttes. Those planning on going on the field trip need to bring extra gas as there are no gas available after you leave Bend. Field Trip Chair Richard Dowty will notify those who have signed up where they are to meet. His phone number is (503) 633 9800. He discussed importance of planning for survival on field trips and offered to show anyone how to pack a survival kit.

Approval of Minutes: Minutes of the March 5, 2009 general meeting and the March 23, 2009 board meeting were approved as they appeared in the Rock hound Rumbblings.

Approval to pay the Bills: Kathy Bennett, treasurer, presented bills for approval from expenses for the show including fluorescent show supplies, tickets,

flyer's, demonstrator expense, expense for mailings to the schools for Friday Kids Day, and supplies for wheel. In addition there was some expense for stamps and supplies for the sunshine committee.

Lapidary Equipment: Since we have moved to the new Salem Senior Center, there is room for more equipment and there are also more people are using the Lapidary Lab. Ted Silver requested that \$1,500 in additional equipment, including another 10" saw and a couple more grinders, be purchased for donation to the Senior Center. A motion was made and passed to do this, then a second motion was made to delay the purchase of the equipment and refer the purchase for consideration by the WAMS board for action. This motion also passed.

Joint WAMS Board and Show Committee Meeting will be April 20 at the Senior Center.

Next General Meeting: Thursday, May 7, at 6:30 at the Senior Center. Show and Tell letter is "R". Karen, Ann, and Lee Anne volunteered to bring refreshments. The program will be any member who wishes to do so can sale rocks or lapidary equipment or supplies.

WAMS Board Meeting

April 21, 2009 at the Salem Center

The board meeting was called to order at 6:34. The focus of the meeting was out 2009 River of Gems Show.

Members present: Phil Knutson, Ed Pyritz, Kathy Bennett, Daniel Bontempo, Janice Van Cura, Ray Haslebacher, Lee Anne Settlemeir, Joe Start, Norm DeRoux, Geri Esch, Linda Groah and Rob Leedy. Also in attendance were Eric Beckland, Mary Haslebacher, Emily Start, Larry Lovell, and Dan Groah.

Banking: Our first discussion was on money market accounts and CD's. At this time, interest rates are very low, and we are not receiving much interest. It was voted to roll over the CD at this time with Kathy Bennett checking the rates. A decision on the money market account can be made at a later date.

Lapidary Equipment: Larry Lovell wanted it to be clear that anyone, not just WAMS members, can come in and use the lapidary equipment in the evenings. Discussion ensued about the purchase of additional equipment for the lapidary shop. Since there was no specific information on either the requested equipment or the cost of the equipment, the decision was deferred to the next board meeting

when we have more specific information about the requested equipment. Larry is to bring the information to the next board meeting.

Show Report

Overview: Our total income this year was \$12,416.13, up \$1,147.59 from last year. The general feeling was that it was a successful show with lots of positive feedback.

Attendance: We had 1900 adults and 480 kids attend our show not counting the school children who came on Friday. Our adult attendance was up 160 from last year, so the raising the price for our show did not have an adverse impact on attendance. The front door reported only one complaint about the increased price.

School Children's Friday: The attendance was down due to budget cuts, but the teachers that came all had good things to say about the show. Having "A Point in Time" back by the children's area instead of with the demonstrators seemed to work quite well. It was very good and educational. The demonstrators also said that fewer children at a time made it possible to do a better job of demonstrating.

Raffle: needs to be pushed if we are going to be successful in this area. The Raffle case had been moved from the front to the Silent Auction area, but was moved back to the front as our Raffle ticket sales were down 66.5% on Friday and 61.4% on Saturday from 2008. On Sunday, when the Raffle case was moved back up front, the sale of tickets was up 22.4%. In addition to location, the Raffle must be promoted at the door.

Dealers: were happier this year than last year, and felt that fewer children on Friday worked better. A cut-off of 1,000 children on Friday was mentioned. For the most part, dealers did better this year than last year.

Thursday Dinner: Over 70 people came to dinner on Thursday. There were very few salads and lots of desserts furnished by members. More salads were needed.

Wednesday set-up: More people could have been used during set up. It would be helpful if we had a second holder for the skirting so that we wouldn't need to change the rolls (which are heavy) back and forth between red and blue. No one followed Tom around to learn the steps of set-up. More direction is needed for those helping with set-up. Because we started later, some of the people ended up staying late to finish set-up.

Security: The security seemed to go well, and the club saved \$281.70 by covering some of the time. The young man from the security company that worked Saturday and Sunday did a good job. It was mentioned that if the members see something suspicious, they should notify security rather than trying to handle it themselves. Security is trained to handle the situation, and if we try to handle it we could be liable. Shows that do not hire uniformed security have had problems with things being taken from dealers during the show.

Demonstrators: There were 13 demonstrators in the demonstrator area plus the one in the wheel of fortune area. We have the most demonstrators of any of the shows in our area. The average number of years a demonstrator has been at our show is a little over seven years. Six of the demonstrators also sold this year. There was some discussion about the demonstrators selling, and a history was given of the selling rules. We need more discussion in this area to work out a compromise that is fair to the demonstrators and also the dealers who are paying a lot more per foot of display space.

Signs: We need more signs leading to the show. Because of ODOT rules, no signs can be placed on the highway right-of-way, and permission must be obtained to place a sign on private property. The exit number on the sign would be helpful.

Silent Auction: The material for our silent auction was better this year, and our income reflected that. This year our income was \$1,451.10, up from \$559.10 last year and \$840.62 in 2007. A big thanks goes to Larry Lovell and his helpers. Storage areas were set up for frequent buyers to make it easier for them, and the auction times were set to various times from 10 minutes to all the show until 4 PM on Sunday. All of the rock cans sold. Some of the rock had a minimum bid and some did not. We discussed placing all the critters in the kid's area to give more room for more trays, and leaving one table in the area for club information and magazines.

It was noted that several things are needed in the area: a better cash box that allows separation of the bills (other areas need better cash boxes too), about 10 lights (the ones we used were borrowed from Rob Leedy), better bags (not flimsy bags, bags with holes, or bags without handles), 3 new timers, tubs for slabs, and a clock.

Kid's Area: Our wheel of fortune actually made \$2 more this year even though we had less than half as many school children. It was more orderly this year with fewer kids. The wheel can only be spun so fast, and a second wheel would be useful on Fridays so that more than one can be playing it. Eric had used a screen to sort out the smallest rocks that were

polished for the grab bags, and this was the kid's favorite prize. Some of the things needed for the kids area are more polished rock, especially fine rock, more equipment to polish more rock. Eric is working on ideas for expanding the kid's area for next year with possibilities including a "Go Fish" type game, a bingo area where rock identification is required, a scoop of sand to sort through, and a promotion of our club's junior program. Better signs to the area are needed.

Display Cases: A chairman's award for the display case was suggested. There were a couple of cases that the person originally scheduled couldn't fill, but replacements were found. The "touching" rock area seemed to be popular.

Clean-up: It was after 9 PM Sunday night before a small group finished cleaning the fairgrounds. More help would have been extremely useful. The tables had to be restacked because the tables are color coded for the carts, and not all tables had been put on the correct cart (the color is not always easy to see). We were asked to sweep in areas outside that we have never been required to do before, and were told that we had to mop the main floor. There were some problems with the cleaning supplies. It was noted that in the future we need to document with a camera the condition of the fairgrounds when we first arrive so that there is not a question about our leaving it "as clean as it was when we arrived".

Miscellaneous: It would be nice to have coffee for dealers, demonstrators and volunteers. We can no longer use the former break room for this purpose. Some of the tables supplied by the fairgrounds are not in good condition, a couple of them collapsed when moved slightly.

Bills: Additional bills for show expense were presented, including dinner expense, popcorn supplies, fairgrounds (building rental, popcorn machine, tables, blue trailer storage), printing and postage. It was voted to pay the bills.

Oral Auction for the Scholarship Fund: \$414.50 was raised

Adjournment was at 8:58.
